

SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTION VISIT

Dr. Raymond Wood, professor emeritus, Department of Anthropology, University of Missouri passed away on October 2, 2020. He was a beloved professor to hundreds of students over his 39 years teaching at Mizzou and his research has stood for decades in Missouri, North Dakota, and across the Plains as an important source of information for researchers. Prior to his passing, he arranged for the Anthropology Archives at the Smithsonian Institution to receive his correspondence files and his friend and colleague, Dr. Bruce McMillan, organized the transfer. On May 10, 2022, Gina Rappaport, Anthropology Archivist for the Smithsonian, arrived to collect Dr. Wood's files. This transfer enables generations of future researchers access to his documents at the Smithsonian, as well as at other institutions including the Museum of Anthropology and State Historical Society of North Dakota. Several of his books and journals were also donated to the MU Museum of Anthropology and the State Historical Society of Missouri. The remainder of his academic works were sold with the proceeds going to his family.

COLLECTIONS UPDATE: 23CY64 TEXTILES

Excavations at Arnold Research Cave in Callaway County revealed an array of rarely found textiles, including baskets, bags, netting, cordage, and most notably, shoes. Thanks to the extremely dry soils inside the cave, these organic materials were remarkably well-preserved, some in seemingly perfect condition. Recently, textile items from Arnold Research Cave which had been on loan to Louisiana State University for research purposes, returned to our care. This spring we have worked on adding these textile objects to our General Collection database making them available to be viewed online for the first time. Included are several complete shoes, woven netting, and other textile fragments. Also added to the database are wooden atlatl foreshafts, one with the lithic stone point amazingly still attached!
